

NOTES ON CONTRIBUTORS

Thomas Alexander teaches at Southern Illinois University at Carbondale. He is the author of John Dewey's Theory of Art, Experience, and Nature: The Illorizons of Feeling (SUNY Press, 1987). In addition to American Philosophy, he is interested in classical philosophy and aesthetics. He is currently at work on a book on Dewey's social and political thought.

Stephen Barker teaches philosophy at Johns Hopkins University. During 1986-87 he served as Distinguished Visiting Professor at the University of New Mexico. He is now preparing a fifth edition of his Elements of Logic. Among his other books are Induction and Hypothesis and Philosophy of Mathematics. His areas of special interest include the theory of knowledge, the history of modern philosophy, logic, and professional ethics.

Houghton Dalrymple's articles have appeared in Southwest Philosophical Studies, Philosophical Topics and Contemporary Philosophy, and he has published two texts on Introductory Logic. His areas of specialization are British empiricism, Philosophy of Mind and Action Theory. He has taught at McMurry University, Auburn University, North Texas State University and the University of Texas at Arlington. He now resides in Arlington, Texas.

Patricia Deduck has published a book on Robbe-Grillet's and Nin's fictional theory, articles on Kafka and Laye, Robbe-Grillet, Tolstoy, Kazantzakis, and Flannery O'Connor; she teaches English and literature at Southwest Texas State University where she continues her study of literature and philosophy.

Emerine Glowienka is Professor of Philosophy at the Gallup Branch College of the University of New Mexico. Her other philosophical articles have appeared in The New Scholasticism, BioScience, Southwest Philosophical Studies, and Proceedings of the American Catholic Philosophical Association.

Anthony Graybosch teaches philosophy at Central State University in Oklahoma. He has published papers on nuclear deterrence, children's rights, and epistemology.

John H. Haddox has been teaching Philosophy at the University of Texas at El Paso for thirty years (nine of which serving as department chairman). Among his publications are Vasconcelos of Mexico: Philosopher and Prophet and Antonio Caso: Philosopher of Mexico (both by University of Texas Press, Austin), two monographs, and numerous articles in academic journals. He was chosen to be a member of the Seminario de la Cultura Mexicana, as the fellow of Samuel Ziegler Foundation for Human Rights, and is the only U.T. El Paso faculty member to receive both the Faculty Research Award and the Award for Distinguished Achievement in Teaching.

Charles J. Harriman B.A. from Columbia College, New York in Philosophy, 1937 followed by two years in U.S. Army Signal Corps. Worked on Wall Street for four years as assistant to the manager of the Purchasing Department at American Sugar Refining Company. Studied English at New York University graduate school. Taught English and Philosophy at an Illinois luntor college for six years. Returned to graduate school in Philosophy. Received Ph.D. from University of New Mexico in 1972. Appointed to College of Santa Fe faculty that year. Chair of Humanities Department since 1981.

Vincent Luizzi is Professor and Chair of Philosophy at Southwest Texas State University. He writes primarily in the areas of philosophy of law and professional ethics and serves as a municipal judge and as a member of the Ethics Committee at Hays Memorial Hospital in San Marcos, Texas. He is currently writing a book on the philosophical dimensions of legal ethics.

Max Oelschlaeger has been a member of the Department of Philosophy at North Texas State University since 1974; he served as Chairman from 1977-85. His published works include The Environmental Imperative: A Socio-Economic Perspective (1977). He is presently working on a book length manuscript, entitled "The Idea of Wilderness: From Magna Mater to Biocentrism, and Beyond," that extends his interest in environmental affairs and ethics to wild nature.

Peter Robinson is Associate Professor of Philosophy at the University of Texas at El Paso. He has taught the range of undergraduate courses in philosophy but his area of specialization is the philosophy and history of science. He has published a variety of articles, mostly in Southwest Philosophical Studies and has completed a book on the concept of progress.

Lawrence K. Schmidt teaches philosophy and is Chairman of the Philosophy Department at Hendrix College, Conway, Arkansas. He received his Dr. Phil. in Philosophy (1983) from the Universitaet Duisburg in Germany. His book entitled The Epistemology of Ilan-George Gadamer is published by Peter Lang, Bern/NY. An article, "When the Text Speak the Truth: The Preconception of Completion," was recently published in The Southern Journal of Philosophy (Vol. 25, #3, 1987).

Larry G. Taylor received his B.A. in English from the University of Texas at Austin and his M.A. in English from North Texas State University. He was also granted an M.A. and Ph.D. in Philosophy from the Florida State University. He is presently serving as an Associate Professor at New Mexico Highlands University. He is the author of "Frege and Husserl," "The Philosophy of Paul Ricoeur: Method and Application; Metaphor and Symbol," "Roman Ingarden's Notion of Polyphonic Harmony," and other works in the field.

Jack Weir is Professor of Philosophy at Hardin-Simmons University and specializes in ethics and philosophy of religion. His articles have appeared in Religious Perspectives, Contemporary Philosophy, and Southwestern Philosophical Studies.

Spencer Wertz teaches and chairs the Philosophy Department at Texas Christian University; his forthcoming book, Talking a Good Game: Inquiries into the Principles of Sport will be published by Southern Methodist University Press in Dallas, Texas. He co-edited an anthology, Sport Inside Out: Readings in Literature and Philosophy (Fort Worth: TCU Press, 1985) and is now working on a book about David Hume.
